CDA Collaborative Learning Projects (CDA, cdacollaborative.org) is a non-profit organization committed to improving the effectiveness of those who work to provide humanitarian assistance, engage in peace practice, support sustainable development, and conduct corporate operations in a socially responsible manner. Through our [collaborative learning process](#), we combine rigorous analysis with pragmatic field-level work and deliver [practical tools](#) to field staff and policymakers alike, based on the findings from the collaborative learning processes. CDA is based in Cambridge, MA, United States, and has an office in Myanmar, which was established to support local application of conflict-sensitivity practices of national and international actors. CDA's activities are structured around two pillars: Collaborative Learning (including applied research) and Advisory Services (including coaching, mentoring, and longer-term accompaniment), tailored to our diverse range of partner and clients. CDA neither implements country-level projects, nor directly engages in advocacy. Our partners and clients value our independence and experience as a convener and facilitator of multi-stakeholder engagements.

OUR APPROACH TO MONITORING, EVALUATION AND LEARNING

CDA helps practitioners and organizations to improve the relevance and effectiveness of humanitarian, development and peacebuilding programming with application of systems approaches, evaluative thinking and learning tools. Our monitoring, evaluation and learning (MEL) approach supports adaptive programming while tracking progress towards program goals and intended change. CDA's collaborative learning and accompaniment services address organizational learning needs and reinforce a culture of reflection, evidence-based decision making, iteration and adaptation.

We believe good monitoring and evaluation starts with strong design – from strategy to project level. CDA uses tools and methodologies informed by evidence on program relevance and effectiveness from our past collaborative learning and advisory work. Our MEL approaches complement current design, monitoring, and evaluation (DM&E) methodologies in the aid sector, and are adapted for programming in fragile and conflict affected states (FCAS.) CDA pursues MEL questions across our four practice areas: [Peacebuilding Effectiveness](#), [Conflict Sensitivity/Do No Harm](#), [Responsible Business](#), and [Accountability and Feedback Loops](#). CDA has contributed to influential policy guidance, such as the [OECD/DAC Guidance on Evaluating Conflict Prevention and Peacebuilding Activities](#), a [practitioner guidance on feedback mechanisms](#), a guide on [evaluative thinking in peacebuilding programs](#), and articles on [systems thinking application in evaluation](#).

We have several on-going collaborative learning, R&D and advisory engagements focused on MEL, such as projects focusing on cumulative and collective impacts in peacebuilding, evidence reviews for the peacebuilding sector, DM&E of prevention of violent extremism programs, monitoring and evaluation (M&E) of conflict sensitivity, and application of feedback mechanisms for adaptive management and program quality improvement.
